Reading Partner Invited Young Readers to Go "Camping" with Pete the Cat

Reading Partner Paul Deltry made a favorite book come alive in a Hamilton Pre-K classroom. Paul, who reads every week with four children in the class, hosted an event for the entire classroom using the story of Pete the Cat Goes Camping. To begin, he played an animated video of the story, and then set up camp, with a tent, "campfire" and more. Paul said, "They liked the s'mores (Pete leaves one for Bigfoot). I watched over the fishing frenzy. When you have 6 poles going at once and some lucky anglers having 2 fish on the line at the same time, it is a wild scene." Hamilton Pre-K Teacher Holly Chiarmiello said, "A big thanks to Paul for organizing and setting this up - the kids had a blast!"

Paul said, "Pete is such a great character and has many adventures. I read the story and thought 'I have all the gear that Pete had on his first camping trip so let's try to recreate as much as possible what he did.' I hope they will remember their camping adventure and how much fun camping and being outdoors is."









The Difference We Make: Through a Student's Eyes

Recently, when I was with my third-grade student at Paige Elementary, she told me that she lost one of her *Uni the Unicorn* books, but it had a happy ending. Her younger sister had taken it to read, and it was under her bed as it was her favorite book.

I responded that I had two thoughts: first, that her sister should have asked if she could borrow the book (and my student said she would have told her sister it was OK), and, second, that it was wonderful that her 6-year-old sister wanted to read the book.

The student replied, "Before I started working with you, I had no books at home - only 'learning books.' Now I have 99 books." (A bit of an exaggeration, as it's closer to 35 since I started working with her two years ago, but it seemed like that many to her). She said she reads every night to her sister and 5-year-old brother when they go to bed. She told me that her brother is scared and wants to snuggle with her and have her read to him, and that by the time she gets to the last page both her brother and sister are asleep.

She also said her brother's favorite book is *The Not Very Pout-Pout Fish*, which we read earlier in the year, and *The Book with No Pictures*, which I had given to her two weeks earlier. She absolutely adored it, and it made her laugh out loud.

After she told me how much the books meant to her, she asked matter-of-factly, "Now can we get back to reading?"

We may sometimes wonder about the impact that RIF makes. This girl's story exemplifies how we make a difference for students, and how that, in turn, ripples out to their families and touches them as well.



Reading Partner Spotlight: A Special Salute to Sally Magid



This month we feature Sally Magid, RIF Reading Partner, & wife of Al Magid, Founder & Executive Director of RIF. After 9 years, Sally has decided that this is her last year working with the RIF students. The RIF team appreciates Sally's wonderful service and honors her!

Sally in her own words

Tell us about your involvement in RIF? I retired from teaching 8th grade English at Mont Pleasant in 1997, took a year off, & came to Pleasant Valley the next year. I worked there with 5th and 6th graders on writing skills. Eighteen years later RIF began, so I joined. I have put in about 9 years with RIF, working with more than thirty K, Ist & 3rd graders at PV over that time.

How do you make reading fun? I give each student a notebook at the start of the school year, to bring to reading time. Each week, I take a word from their reading book and show them how "if you can read THAT word, you can read so many others, just by changing the first letter sound" (ie: book/look, took, hook, or cat/hat, mat, rat, sat). I write those words in their notebooks. Then, students copy them, say them, and feel a sense of satisfaction of being able to read a whole list of words!

What is your favorite RIF memory? When any child sounds out a word that is new and 'gets it!'

Describe your professional background. I have taught for 35 years, with 25 of them in Schenectady. I am a trained teacher of the blind & taught legally blind (partially sighted) kids for 4 1/2 years, mostly in Michigan at the State School for the Blind (now a minimum security prison!). Stevie Wonder was a student while I taught there, but I was not his teacher.

What are "Sally's Books"? When I first began mentoring, I was frustrated with the almost NON level of reading with the students I had. I decided to make my own books (now in the RIF library as "Sally's Books.") Each one requires the student's name be a part of the story, and I found that kept them interested. I would draw on a ponytail or long hair or short hair to fit the student who was reading. For me, these were a great help in drawing kids into a REAL book during the lesson.

Tell us about your pastimes. I have been 'working' at Schenectady Day Nursery for 27 years, reading to three classes, doing exercises with them, and teaching them songs. Traveling abroad has always been a joy, but harder to do as one gets older and plane rides seem longer. Now we will be traveling to Boston, Minneapolis, and Phoenix to see our children.

I have loved working with RIF and the teachers and students along the way. I will still be active, putting labels in books, doing a reading if there's a need for SIRIF, and working always for Scrabble Rama, our one RIF fundraiser. Oh, and getting all of those books, bags, and t-shirts ready for SIRIF!
