
RIF is so grateful to Joe, Connie, friends, & family for their remarkable gifts. We wish Joe many many more happy birthdays. "A cent'anni!"

Where and with what age group do you work? Howe Elementary, 1st grade, Cathy Curtis.

Why did you get involved with RIF? I started last January, & couldn't start in the fall because I was recovering from cancer treatment. I've been involved with other reading and mentoring programs for decades.

How do you make reading fun? Go beyond what's on the page into their related experiences and ideas; explore together. Also do drawing related to the reading.

I sing and play guitar at local venues with three different musical duets, and love cycling and hiking. Married to a retired teacher with three overeducated kids and one grandchild! I'm also a handyman with Umbrella of the Capital District, helping seniors with home maintenance and repairs.

#### Why did you get involved with RIF?

learned about RIF from the newspaper & friends. I liked the idea of working one-onone with a student. I was a classroom teacher for 32 yrs in Scotia-Glenville & Niskayuna, and it was rare to spend more than 5-10 minutes with one child. I also love the idea of giving children a book to foster their interest in reading. This is my 3rd year in the RIF program.

How do you make reading fun? When I first start my year with a child, I try different activities. We might play rhyming games, use markers, crayons, or colored pencils to trace letters or do a coloring activity. Some children will like working in a journal. It's a discovery process.

What are your hobbies? I love the outdoors so I try to get outside daily. My favorite walk is in a nature preserve or a park. I take yoga and essentric exercise classes and meet friends for lunch. I have a bookclub, which has met for 17 years. I became a grandmother about a year & a half ago, and seeing my grandson gives me the most pleasure.
