WELCOME AND/OR WELCOME BACK TO A NEW SCHOOL YEAR: Yes, I know it's November already – heck, it's nearly Thanksgiving – and many of us have been reading with our students for a whole bunch of weeks. Before we get too much deeper into this school year, here are some opening remarks from the Executive Director of The Reading Is Fun Program, Al Magid:

"A paean of praise for **The Reading Is Fun Program (RIF**) which, by its labors over the past decade, has earned an important place in the civic firmament of Schenectady. **RIF** could not have achieved that stature without the robust support of a wide array of local and neighboring interests, among them its large cohort of volunteer reading mentors who work one-on-one with students in the lower grades in all 11 elementary schools in the **Schenectady City School District**, to help improve the youngsters' reading and conversational

skills; the many elementary-school teachers and principals in the district and its central administration and other staff, who continue to evince, by word and deed, their warm embrace of **RIF**'s core volunteer-mentoring mission in support of the district's key educational goals; and, spearheaded by the **Wright Family Foundation** in Schenectady and the **Seymour Fox Foundation** in Troy, the many foundations and businesses and fraternal organizations and religious institutions and individuals that donate money and books and administrative and library and storage space that enable **RIF** to purchase and handle 10,000 books annually, to gift to hundreds of youngsters in the lower elementary-school grades to take home and enjoy in the company of family members and with which to build home libraries."

RIF BY THE NUMBERS: Although it's pretty much a moveable feast, at this writing RIF has **94** Volunteers working with **77** Teachers and **220** students in all **11** of Schenectady's elementary schools. That's more of each than we ended the last school year with – and I'm pretty sure those numbers will continue to grow.



BACK TO SCHOOL EVENTS: Thanks to the ongoing efforts of our Events Coordinator, Jan Gallas, and the encouragement of the **SCSD Parent Liaisons**, **RIF** was invited to participate in a number of Back-to-School events at several of the elementary schools, including Paige, Keane, Van Corlaer and Hamilton. Various volunteers brought a table and chairs, some signs, and a whole bunch of books to give away to any and all attendees. See **PICTURES AT ELEVEN.**

SUPERINTENDENT'S DAY: With the assistance and cooperation of **SCSD** Assistant Superintendent Joe DiCaprio and **RIF** Volunteer Coordinator Valerie Rivera, **RIF** volunteers were invited to attend the September 6th Superintendent's Day faculty meetings at each elementary school and give a

brief introduction to **The Reading Is Fun Program**, with the hope of reaching out to teachers, new and old, who may not have partnered with **RIF** before. Despite a glitch here and there, nearly every school heard from our volunteers and received flyers with contact information on an extremely hot late summer day.

WELCOME/WELCOME BACK SOIRÉE: On Monday, September 18th, the RIF Leadership Team hosted a "Thank You and Welcome Back" event at the RIF Library for returning and new volunteers to get together, meet new faces, listen to updates from Leadership Team members, and sample the "light refreshments". Upwards of 30 volunteers attended, chatted, and sampled the goodies from Villa Italia and other local 'refreshment-providers'. VOLUNTEER SUPPORT FORUM: The inaugural Support Forum for Volunteers for the 2023-24 school year was held on October 26th. This time, we ran a "Live/Remote" session – with reasonably decent results (hey, it was our first time!). Some Grant information, plus Volunteer and Library updates were provided, as well as a presentation about the importance of rhyming skills from volunteer Joan LaBombard, followed by an open discussion and feedback session. IN CASE YOU MISSED IT: In the July 3rd edition of **The Daily Gazette**, the Opinion page's "*High Notes*" feature included this recap of our 'Spring Into Reading' event:

In Schenectady, The Reading Is Fun Program (RIF) recently completed its second annual weeklong Spring Into Reading Is Fun event. The event, made possible by a grant from the Wright Family Foundation, was organized around the 800 first-graders in 47 classes spanning the 11 elementary schools in the Schenectady City School District. Nearly 50 RIF volunteer reading mentors each met with a first-grade class to read a book. The Wright

grant allowed RIF to provide each first-grader with five books to take home and enjoy over the summer break. Each youngster was also given a colorful imprinted tote bag and a T shirt. Each first-grade classroom library also received a book. Classroom teachers and their aides oversaw the event, and district facilities staff trucked nearly 100 cartons filled with books, tote bags and T-shirts for the event. LIBRARY NEWS: The **RIF Library** is located on the second floor of the **Faith United Methodist Church** at 811 North Brandywine Avenue, in office space that the Church donates to us, and which has been expanded in recent months to include a Library Office outfitted with Information Technology equipment, including things like a computer, a printer/scanner/copier, internet connectivity, a projector, a hand-held scanner, a laminator, and other pieces of 20th and 21st century artifice. We employ said devices to help train our new volunteers, and we are developing methodologies to

enhance our literary acquisitions, hoping to track the types and titles of books that our volunteers and, especially, our students find the most successful for helping with their love of reading. This is exciting stuff for us and we're grateful to **Stewart's Shops** for contributing to our burgeoning technological advancements.
